GEOLOGY DEVELOPMENTS DURING FINAL DAYS OF THE SAN

MANUEL MINE AND PLANT SITE

ABSTRACT: In the process of closing the San Manuel Mine and Plant Sites, BHP Copper has been required by regulatory agencies and its own corporate board to prepare detailed characterizations of groundwater, surface and bedrock geology, waste rock dumps, the heap and tailings facilities, cover materials, and potentially impacted



soil in the vicinity of the smelter/concentrator. Modeling has been completed to assess long-term groundwater quality at both sites and to predict the timing and quality of a future pit lake at the Mine. The various studies were incorporated into the engineering design plans for closure and addressed potential long-term environmental risks.

New geology developments at the Plant Site include the first updated surface geology map in more than 30 years and the discovery of a horst block beneath the tailings facility that extends the proven length of the San Manuel Fault to more than 15 miles. Detailed geochemical characterization of the tailings show that the residual sulfides are encapsulated in quartz and pose little risk of producing acidic leachate that would jeopardize water quality in the San Pedro River Basin. Groundwater and pit lake characterization studies at the Mine affirm the need for mine geologists to collect geochemical and hydrological data during all phases of exploration and development to support environmental programs during the mining life cycle. Major closure activities at the Mine will be completed in April 2006 and by June 2007 at the Plant. The talk will highlight new geologic discoveries and give an update on the timetable for the remaining remediation and reclamation activities. *Cori Hoag can be contacted at choag@srk.com or* (520) 544-3688.

AGS SPRING FIELD TRIP

Investigation of Breccia Pipe and Shear Zone Systems in West Central Arizona

Dates: Friday March 24 to Sunday March 26

Field Trip Leaders: Rich Lundin, Carothers Environmental, Patrick O'Hara, Caaterskill Exploration, Jon Spencer, AZGS.

Trip Plan:

Friday: The field trip will begin at the Yarnell Community Center with a Poster Session and Social Hour from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Friday, March 24th. Moderate-low price motels and campgrounds are available in Yarnell (other facilities available in Wickenburg and Prescott - see lodging/camping info at the March 7th dinner meeting).

Saturday: The Field Trip begins at 7:00 a.m. at the Community Center in Yarnell. Drive to Skull Valley Community Center in Yarnell with a drive to Skull Valley and the Copper Basin Breccia Pipes with a picnic lunch at the site. After lunch, motor through Congress to Wickenburg (change into 4WD vehicles) and then to Constellation to see the Breccia Pipes there, leaving Constellation in late afternoon, through Wickenburg for arrival at around 6 p.m to Robson's Mining World (see www.robsonsminingworld.com) or other nearby hotel in Wickenburg.

Robson's Mining World is near Aguila, Arizona and west of Wickenburg with rustic but very clean B & B rooms (double occupancy). Twelve regular rooms have been reserved on a "first come, first served" basis and include a choice of 1 Queen size bed/room or 1 double & 1 twin bed/room. The price is \$90.30 room/night including a full breakfast; they take cash or

checks only - no credit cards. Other accommodations are available in Wickenburg or Aguila. Dry camping is available on site for \$5.

Robson's is and interesting museum of mining artifacts and technology and a restful place where Yavapai College has taught mining history and technology classes for the past 8 years. There is a \$5 entry fee to Robson's if you are not a guest in the lodge.

Dinner at Robson's will begin at 6:30 p.m. and include a steak fry for the group (\$10/person for oven baked chicken and \$14 for mesquite-barbequed steak). Dinner includes rolls, salad, veggies, and stuffed baked potatoes. From ~7:00-9:00 p.m., we will have time to look around the museum grounds and hear a lecture on the geology of the area by Jon Spencer of the Arizona Geological Survey.

Sunday: For the folks staying at

Robson's, breakfast is at 8 a.m. and they will provide fixings to make your own sandwich after breakfast. Leave Robson's at 9:00 a.m. to drive to Congress. Other trip members will meet group in Congress. The Field Trip resumes at 9:45 a.m. at the Congress Store with a trip to the Breccia Pipes in the Date Creek and Weaver Mountains. Snacks/sodas will be provided. The trip will end at Yarnell at 2:00 p.m.

Guidebook: The field trip guidebook will cover the past history, occurrence and genesis of the breccia systems; their similarity to other breccia systems in Arizona and the economic potential of these types of systems for Cu, Au, Mo, W, and U mineralization.

Lodging: Motels and campgrounds are available in Yarnell, Wickenburg, and Pres-

cott (more details will be available soon and will be emailed to the participants).

Transportation: High clearance vehicles are required for this trip. We will use participant vehicles and carpool from Tucson and Phoenix areas. Please let Rich know if you can drive and have space to take passengers, or if you will need a ride. Passengers should assist the driver with gas money. Carpool locations in Tucson

and Phoenix will be set once we have a list of participants.

Registration: A reservation for the trip will be held by pre-payment by cash or check. The cost of the trip is \$50 including guidebook, two lunches, and snacks/sodas. Registration without guidebook is \$30. The fee for full-time students is \$10. Please pay at March 7th dinner meeting or by check to AGS P.O. Box 40952, Tucson, AZ 85717 prior to March 23. A
